

COVID-19 Prevention Program (CPP)

Arvin Union Elementary School District

This CPP is designed to control exposures to the SARS-CoV-2 virus that may occur in our workplace.

Date: December 23, 2020

Authority and Responsibility

The District Superintendent has overall authority and responsibility for implementing the provisions of this CPP in our workplace. In addition, all managers and supervisors are responsible for implementing and maintaining the CPP in their assigned work areas and for ensuring employees receive answers to questions about the program in a language they understand.

All employees are responsible for using safe work practices, following all directives, policies and procedures, and assisting in maintaining a safe work environment.

Identification and Evaluation of COVID-19 Hazards

We will implement the following in our workplace:

- Conduct workplace-specific evaluations using the Appendix A: Identification of COVID-19 Hazards form.
- Evaluate employees' potential workplace exposures to all persons at, or who may enter, our workplace.
- Review applicable orders and general and industry-specific guidance from the State of California, Cal/OSHA, and the local health department related to COVID-19 hazards and prevention.
- Evaluate existing COVID-19 prevention controls in our workplace and the need for different or additional controls.
- Conduct periodic inspections using the Appendix B: COVID-19 Inspections form as needed to identify unhealthy conditions, work practices, and work procedures related to COVID-19 and to ensure compliance with our COVID-19 policies and procedures.

Employee Participation

Employees and their authorized employees' representatives are encouraged to participate in the identification and evaluation of COVID-19 hazards by:

reporting to their immediate supervisor or union representative who are expected to immediately contact the District Superintendent. In addition, Appendix A and B of this plan will be utilized by site safety teams to identify any possible hazards for remedy.

Employee Screening

We screen our employees by:

utilization of STOPit SafeScreen, a self screening application which reports responses to supervisors and the District Office. This online app follows CDPH guidelines and provides a pass/no pass entry pass upon completion. In addition, temperatures are measured utilizing non-contact thermometers at each school site and office location. Face coverings are to be utilized by both the screener and the employee during temperature screening.

Correction of COVID-19 Hazards

Unsafe or unhealthy work conditions, practices or procedures will be documented on the Appendix B: COVID-19 Inspections form, and corrected in a timely manner based on the severity of the hazards, as follows:

Thorough completion of Appendix B: COVID -19 Inspections form includes identification of a status and severity of a hazard, the name of an individual or names of individuals assigned to correct the hazard, and a timeline for correction. The assessing individual or team will review any hazard identified and correct immediately if possible. Severity of a hazard and timeline for correction are based on exposure risk, scheduled occupancy of the location, and most urgent...a positive case identification. Items beyond the scope of the individual or site team are to be referred to the District Superintendent who will assign remediation to the appropriate department and/or work with the site to acquire necessary items or make modifications to physical locations or personnel assigned to rectify the hazard. All COVID-19 hazard inspections are to be scanned and sent immediately to the District Superintendent and the Director of MOT. Weekly safety meeting updates may cause modification to the initial template if additional hazard areas or items suggested for review are identified. Inspections are reviewed for follow-up per correction date assigned.

Controls of COVID-19 Hazards

Physical Distancing

Where possible, we ensure at least six feet of physical distancing at all times in our workplace by:

- Eliminating the need for workers to be in the workplace through facilitation of work at home when job duties allow or hybrid schedules to decrease the number of people at a worksite
- Reducing the number of persons in an area at one time, including visitors.
- Visual cues such as signs and floor markings to indicate where employees and others should be located or their direction and path of travel.
- Staggered arrival, departure, work, and break times.
- Utilizing large areas for production of grab and go materials and utilizing outside areas when possible for distribution.
- Desks/work areas are separated by 6 feet as space allows.
- Reference section 3205(c)(6) for details]

Individuals will be kept as far apart as possible when there are situations where six feet of physical distancing cannot be achieved.

Face Coverings

We provide clean, undamaged face coverings and ensure they are properly worn by employees over the nose and mouth when indoors, and when outdoors and less than six feet away from another person, including non-employees, and where required by orders from the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) or local health department.

A week's worth of face masks were provided to each employee at the beginning of the school year. In addition, plastic shields were purchased and have been distributed to those staff working directly with the public or with students. Sufficient quantities of face coverings are kept in storage at our warehouse to replace masks or shields as needed. Staff are expected to wash their own masks to prevent cross-contamination and support the security of having a set of personal masks. Employees encountering non-employees not wearing face coverings are expected to state the requirement for entering with a face covering and to offer one if the non-employees do not have a face covering available.

The following are exceptions to the use of face coverings in our workplace:

- When an employee is alone in a room.
- While eating and drinking at the workplace, provided employees are at least six feet apart and outside air supply to the area, if indoors, has been maximized to the extent possible.
- Employees wearing respiratory protection in accordance with CCR Title 8 section 5144 or other safety orders.
- Employees who cannot wear face coverings due to a medical or mental health condition or disability, or who are hearing-impaired or communicating with a hearing-impaired person. Alternatives will be considered on a case-by-case basis.
- Specific tasks that cannot feasibly be performed with a face covering, where employees will be kept at least six feet apart.

Any employee not wearing a face covering, face shield with a drape or other effective alternative, or respiratory protection, for any reason, shall be at least six feet apart from all other persons unless the unmasked employee is tested at least twice weekly for COVID-19.

Engineering controls

We implement the following measures for situations where we cannot maintain at least six feet between individuals:

Plastic partitions have been made available to provide an additional level of protection between the public and office/assessment staff and are set up in all offices. Large plastic dividers on rollers are provided to separate office staff sitting in close proximity as well as to provide an extra layer of protection for classroom staff who select to use when in class with students.

We maximize, to the extent feasible, the quantity of outside air for our buildings with mechanical or natural ventilation systems by:

- Encouraging staff to open doors and windows when possible.
- Utilizing separate classroom heating/cooling units with individual filters throughout the majority of campuses to circulate outside air through rooms.
- Utilize computer-based ventilation software to adjust temperature and air flow supported by an district employed HVAC technician.

Cleaning and disinfecting

We implement the following cleaning and disinfection measures for frequently touched surfaces:

We utilize the following supplies in our cleaning procedures. We have an inventory control system to keep our supplies at a desired level utilizing minimum and maximum quantities for each item. All custodial employees are given 15 minutes per classroom for cleaning. In the event of a positive case the cleaning for an affected area is extended to 2 – 3 hours, depending on size of affected area. We use the following cleaning supplies at all sites. Utilized facilities are cleaned on a daily basis following a checklist developed by the Director of MOT. Rooms not in active use are cleaned prior to being used.

1. WAXIE Surface Disinfectant Hospital Spray
2. Z Bioscience Enviromist – Probiotic Fogging Solution
3. Z Bioscience Multi-Task – Probiotic Cleaner
4. Z Bioscience Max Degreaser – Probiotic Cleaner
5. Caresour Alcohol Wipes – 75% Alcohol Solution
6. Facilipro Concentrated 34 - Floor Cleaner (for restroom caddy)
7. Facilipro Concentratwed 93 – Bathroom Cleaner (for restroom caddy)

All hard surface contact areas are to be disinfected with WAXIE Surface Disinfectant. This would include desktops (when students are in class), countertops, door handles, cabinet handles, pencil sharpeners and teachers desk and phone. The spray must be allowed to stand on the surface for at least 10 minutes to be effective. All areas are cleaned with Z Bioscience Multi-Task Probiotic cleaner prior to disinfecting. WAXIE Surface Disinfectant may not be used on any dishes, glasses, or utensils. Once the affected area has been thoroughly deep cleaned we then fog the entire room, including the registers for heating/cooling, with a Probiotic Enviro-mist that puts a microbial barrier on all surfaces. Rooms deep cleaned due to a positive case are then closed for an additional 24 hours before that area can be used for office/classroom studies.

Should we have a COVID-19 case in our workplace, we will implement the following procedures:

We isolate the affected room/area for 3 days before entering. Once the 3 day quarantine passes, we enter the room, making sure our employees have all the required PPE and follow the cleaning protocol listed below: We utilize in-house staff for all cleaning and disinfecting. They have all been trained on proper cleaning techniques and utilize the cleaning supplies and procedures that were outlined earlier. Will have refresher training as needed. District employees equipped with materials and product listed here will clean and disinfect areas, materials, and equipment used by a COVID-19 case and in areas where a COVID-19 case may have traveled to or through. Rooms are to be marked as "do not enter" prior to cleaning. Staff will be assigned by the MOT Director and areas for deep cleaning identified and cleaned/sanitized by the cleaning crew or individual. Each member of the cleaning crew is to wear protective garments, gloves, and face protection. For protection, they are to wash hands and utilize sanitizer prior to beginning and throughout the cleaning process. Gloves are to be changed between each specific cleaning area.

Materials and products provided to staff include

1. WAXIE Surface Disinfectant Hospital Spray
2. Z Bioscience Enviromist – Probiotic Fogging Solution
3. Z Bioscience Multi-Task – Probiotic Cleaner
4. Z Bioscience Max Degreaser – Probiotic Cleaner
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Shared tools, equipment and personal protective equipment (PPE)

PPE must not be shared, e.g., gloves, goggles and face shields.

Items that employees come in regular physical contact with, such as phones, headsets, desks, keyboards, writing materials, instruments and tools must also not be shared, to the extent feasible. Where there must be sharing, the items will be disinfected between uses by:

utilizing provided sanitizing wipes or spray as appropriate. This includes shared items such as microwaves, refrigerators, office copiers, fax machines, and postage meters. Items shared are to be disinfected prior to and after use. In addition, the cleaning crew will spray probiotic mist on an assigned schedule of no less than once per week and more often for high use areas.

Sharing of vehicles will be minimized to the extent feasible, and high-touch points (for example, steering wheel, door handles, seatbelt buckles, armrests, shifter, etc.) will be disinfected between users.

Hand sanitizing

In order to implement effective hand sanitizing procedures, we:

have evaluated handwashing facilities at each campus and office with assigned areas and groups for use. Additional measures include:

- Encourage and allow time for employee handwashing.
- Providing employees with an effective hand sanitizer in all rooms and offices and prohibit hand sanitizers that contain methanol (i.e. methyl alcohol).
- Encouraging employees to wash their hands for at least 20 seconds every time they wash.
- Have evaluated handwashing facilities and purchased mobile hand-washing stations for use at each site in portables without running water and/or outside areas as needed.
- Hands free hand sanitizing stations have been constructed by district maintenance staff for various office areas.

Personal protective equipment (PPE) used to control employees' exposure to COVID-19

We evaluate the need for PPE (such as gloves, goggles, and face shields) as required by CCR Title 8, section 3380, and provide such PPE as needed.

When it comes to respiratory protection, we evaluate the need in accordance with CCR Title 8 section 5144 when the physical distancing requirements are not feasible or maintained. [reference section 3205(c)(E) for details on required respirator and eye protection use.]

We provide and ensure use of eye protection and respiratory protection in accordance with section 5144 when employees are exposed to procedures that may aerosolize potentially infectious material such as saliva or respiratory tract fluids.

Investigating and Responding to COVID-19 Cases

This will be accomplished by using the Appendix C: Investigating COVID-19 Cases form.

Employees who had potential COVID-19 exposure in our workplace will be:

offered COVID-19 testing at no cost during their working hours through Kern County Public Health or sent to a service covered by insurance. The information on benefits described in Training and Instruction, and Exclusion of COVID-19 Cases will be provided to them by the Human Resources Department.

System for Communicating

Our goal is to ensure that we have effective two-way communication with our employees, in a form they can readily understand, and that it includes the following information:

- Who employees should report COVID-19 symptoms and possible hazards to, and how:

Employees should contact their Direct Supervisor to report COVID-19 symptoms through phone, text, email, or TEAMS so long as the message is confirmed as having been received. Continued efforts should be made to ensure the supervisor is notified. Symptoms are also to be reported in the STOPit SafeScreen app each morning prior to arrival at work. Any symptoms marked will indicate a Red – No Pass and staff may only be cleared to enter by their supervisor.

Possible hazards are also to be directed to immediate supervisors who are to relay this information immediately to the Human Resource Manager and/or the District Superintendent. Hazards may be reported in person or in any of the means listed above.

In the event the district is required to provide testing because of a workplace exposure or outbreak, district office staff will communicate the plan for providing testing and inform affected employees of the reason for the testing and the possible consequences of a positive test. In the event a situation requires testing due to an employee exposure, staff will be released during working hours to be tested. The Public Health Department in Arvin is a recommended location. In addition, staff may be released during work hours to utilize insurance plans for testing in a physicians office or medical center. During a scenario with multiple COVID-19 cases or a major outbreak, the district office staff will contact Public Health prior to sending staff to ensure adequate services or response are in place when the testing is in response to CCR Title 8 section 3205.1, Multiple COVID-19 Infections and COVID-19 Outbreaks, as well as section 3205.2, Major COVID-19 Outbreaks.

- That employees can report symptoms and hazards without fear of reprisal.
- Our procedures or policies for accommodating employees with medical or other conditions that put them at increased risk of severe COVID-19 illness.

- Where testing is not required, how employees can access COVID-19 testing:

Where testing is not required but an employee has symptoms and voluntarily selects to be tested to ensure the safety of themselves and others there are various options. Employees can access COVID-19 testing through Kern County Public Health with a location in Arvin and multiple locations in Bakersfield. In addition, there are no-cost options in Bakersfield able to be accessed. Another option is to utilize employee health plans to access testing through a physician or medical center.

- In the event we are required to provide testing because of a workplace exposure or outbreak, we will communicate the plan for providing testing and inform affected employees of the reason for the testing and the possible consequences of a positive test.

In the event a situation requires testing due to an employee exposure, staff will be released during working hours to be tested. The Public Health Department in Arvin is a recommended location. In addition, staff may be released during work hours to utilize insurance plans for testing in a physicians office or medical center. During a scenario with multiple COVID-19 cases or a major outbreak, the district office staff will contact Public Health prior to sending staff to ensure adequate services or response are in place when the testing is in response to CCR Title 8 section 3205.1, Multiple COVID-19 Infections and COVID-19 Outbreaks, as well as section 3205.2, Major COVID-19 Outbreaks.

- Information about COVID-19 hazards employees (including other employers and individuals in contact with our workplace) may be exposed to, what is being done to control those hazards, and our COVID-19 policies and procedures.

The Human Resources Department has communicated methods of surveillance testing, locations of test sights, and suggestions for rapid test support.

Emails are periodically sent to all district personnel sharing guidelines and procedures to mitigate hazards and to reinforce COVID-19 policies and procedures.

Letters are sent to staff indicating exposures and relating how to provide protection to themselves and others to control hazards.

Implementation of the COVID-19 Inspections and Appendix A; Identification of COVID-19 Hazards will provide information which will be openly shared with staff.

Training and Instruction

We will provide effective training and instruction that includes:

COVID-19 Prevention Program

- Our COVID-19 policies and procedures to protect employees from COVID-19 hazards.
 - Information regarding COVID-19-related benefits to which the employee may be entitled under applicable federal, state, or local laws.
 - The fact that:
 - COVID-19 is an infectious disease that can be spread through the air.
 - COVID-19 may be transmitted when a person touches a contaminated object and then touches their eyes, nose, or mouth.
 - An infectious person may have no symptoms.
 - Methods of physical distancing of at least six feet and the importance of combining physical distancing with the wearing of face coverings.
 - The fact that particles containing the virus can travel more than six feet, especially indoors, so physical distancing must be combined with other controls, including face coverings and hand hygiene, to be effective.
 - The importance of frequent hand washing with soap and water for at least 20 seconds and using hand sanitizer when employees do not have immediate access to a sink or hand washing facility, and that hand sanitizer does not work if the hands are soiled.
 - Proper use of face coverings and the fact that face coverings are not respiratory protective equipment - face coverings are intended to primarily protect other individuals from the wearer of the face covering.
 - COVID-19 symptoms, and the importance of obtaining a COVID-19 test and not coming to work if the employee has COVID-19 symptoms.
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- Utilization of Personal Protective Equipment including sanitizer, masks, and spray.
 - Following assigned site routines and assigned areas by site maps

Appendix D: COVID-19 Training Roster will be used to document this training.

Exclusion of COVID-19 Cases

Where we have a COVID-19 case in our workplace, we will limit transmission by:

- Ensuring that COVID-19 cases are excluded from the workplace until our return-to-work requirements are met.
- Excluding employees with COVID-19 exposure from the workplace for 14 days after the last known COVID-19 exposure to a COVID-19 case.
- Continuing and maintaining an employee's earnings, seniority, and all other employee rights and benefits whenever we've demonstrated that the COVID-19 exposure is work related. This will be accomplished by

identifying leaves available to the employee. When possible, excluded cases will be provided the opportunity for work-at-home remote status. Next steps as necessary begin with utilization of CFFRA leave if available, possible workman's compensation benefits, or utilization of employer-provided sick leave.

- Providing employees at the time of exclusion with information on available benefits.

Reporting, Recordkeeping, and Access

It is our policy to:

- Report information about COVID-19 cases at our workplace to the local health department whenever required by law, and provide any related information requested by the local health department.
- Report immediately to Cal/OSHA any COVID-19-related serious illnesses or death, as defined under CCR Title 8 section 330(h), of an employee occurring in our place of employment or in connection with any employment.
- Maintain records of the steps taken to implement our written COVID-19 Prevention Program in accordance with CCR Title 8 section 3203(b).
- Make our written COVID-19 Prevention Program available at the workplace to employees, authorized employee representatives, and to representatives of Cal/OSHA immediately upon request.
- Use the **Appendix C: Investigating COVID-19 Cases** form to keep a record of and track all COVID-19 cases. The information will be made available to employees, authorized employee representatives, or as otherwise required by law, with personal identifying information removed.

Prior to this guidance and Appendices, the district has utilized, and will continue to utilize, forms provided by Kern County Public Health in addition to provided OSHA forms for required reporting.

Return-to-Work Criteria

- COVID-19 cases with COVID-19 symptoms will not return to work until all the following have occurred:
 - At least 24 hours have passed since a fever of 100.4 or higher has resolved without the use of fever-reducing medications.
 - COVID-19 symptoms have improved.
 - At least 10 days have passed since COVID-19 symptoms first appeared.
- COVID-19 cases who tested positive but never developed COVID-19 symptoms will not return to work until a minimum of 10 days have passed since the date of specimen collection of their first positive COVID-19 test.
- A negative COVID-19 test will not be required for an employee to return to work.
- If an order to isolate or quarantine an employee is issued by a local or state health official, the employee will not return to work until the period of isolation or quarantine is completed or the order is lifted. If no period was specified, then the period will be 10 days from the time the order to isolate was effective, or 14 days from the time the order to quarantine was effective.

Appendix A: Identification of COVID-19 Hazards

All persons, regardless of symptoms or negative COVID-19 test results, will be considered potentially infectious. Particular attention will be paid to areas where people may congregate or come in contact with one another, regardless of whether employees are performing an assigned work task or not. For example: meetings, entrances, bathrooms, hallways, aisles, walkways, elevators, break or eating areas, cool-down areas, and waiting areas.

Evaluation of potential workplace exposure will be to all persons at the workplace or who may enter the workplace, including coworkers, employees of other entities, members of the public, customers or clients, and independent contractors. We will consider how employees and other persons enter, leave, and travel through the workplace, in addition to addressing fixed work locations.

All COVID-19 testing or related medical services provided by us will be provided in a manner that ensures the confidentiality of employees, with the exception of unredacted information on COVID-19 cases that will be provided immediately upon request to the local health department, CDPH, Cal/OSHA, the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH), or as otherwise required by law.

All employees' medical records will also be kept confidential and not disclosed or reported without the employee's express written consent to any person within or outside the workplace, with the following exceptions: (1) Unredacted medical records provided to the local health department, CDPH, Cal/OSHA, NIOSH, or as otherwise required by law immediately upon request; and (2) Records that do not contain individually identifiable medical information or from which individually identifiable medical information has been removed.

Additional Consideration #1

Multiple COVID-19 Infections and COVID-19 Outbreaks

This section of CPP will stay in effect until there are no new COVID-19 cases detected in our workplace for a 14-day period.

COVID-19 testing

- We will provide COVID-19 testing to all employees in our exposed workplace except for employees who were not present during the period of an outbreak identified by a local health department or the relevant 14-day period. COVID-19 testing will be provided at no cost to employees during employees' working hours.
- COVID-19 testing consists of the following:
 - All employees in our exposed workplace will be immediately tested and then tested again one week later. Negative COVID-19 test results of employees with COVID-19 exposure will not impact the duration of any quarantine period required by, or orders issued by, the local health department.
 - After the first two COVID-19 tests, we will continue to provide COVID-19 testing of employees who remain at the workplace at least once per week, or more frequently if recommended by the local health department, until there are no new COVID-19 cases detected in our workplace for a 14-day period.
 - We will provide additional testing when deemed necessary by Cal/OSHA.

Exclusion of COVID-19 cases

We will ensure COVID-19 cases and employees who had COVID-19 exposure are excluded from the workplace in accordance with our CPP **Exclusion of COVID-19 Cases** and **Return to Work Criteria** requirements, and local health officer orders if applicable.

Investigation of workplace COVID-19 illness

We will immediately investigate and determine possible workplace-related factors that contributed to the COVID-19 outbreak in accordance with our CPP **Investigating and Responding to COVID-19 Cases**.

COVID-19 investigation, review and hazard correction

In addition to our CPP **Identification and Evaluation of COVID-19 Hazards** and **Correction of COVID-19 Hazards**, we will immediately perform a review of potentially relevant COVID-19 policies, procedures, and controls and implement changes as needed to prevent further spread of COVID-19.

The investigation and review will be documented and include:

- Investigation of new or unabated COVID-19 hazards including:
 - Our leave policies and practices and whether employees are discouraged from remaining home when sick.
 - Our COVID-19 testing policies.
 - Insufficient outdoor air.
 - Insufficient air filtration.
 - Lack of physical distancing.
- Updating the review:
 - Every thirty days that the outbreak continues.
 - In response to new information or to new or previously unrecognized COVID-19 hazards.

- When otherwise necessary.
- Implementing changes to reduce the transmission of COVID-19 based on the investigation and review. We will consider:
 - Moving indoor tasks outdoors or having them performed remotely.
 - Increasing outdoor air supply when work is done indoors.
 - Improving air filtration.
 - Increasing physical distancing as much as possible.
 - Respiratory protection.

Notifications to the local health department

- Immediately, but no longer than 48 hours after learning of three or more COVID-19 cases in our workplace, we will contact the local health department for guidance on preventing the further spread of COVID-19 within the workplace.
- We will provide to the local health department the total number of COVID-19 cases and for each COVID-19 case, the name, contact information, occupation, workplace location, business address, the hospitalization and/or fatality status, and North American Industry Classification System code of the workplace of the COVID-19 case, and any other information requested by the local health department. We will continue to give notice to the local health department of any subsequent COVID-19 cases at our workplace.

Additional Consideration #2

Major COVID-19 Outbreaks

This section of CPP will stay in effect until there are no new COVID-19 cases detected in our workplace for a 14-day period.

COVID-19 testing

We will provide twice a week COVID-19 testing, or more frequently if recommended by the local health department, to all employees present at our exposed workplace during the relevant 30-day period(s) and who remain at the workplace. COVID-19 testing will be provided at no cost to employees during employees' working hours.

Exclusion of COVID-19 cases

We will ensure COVID-19 cases and employees with COVID-19 exposure are excluded from the workplace in accordance with our CPP **Exclusion of COVID-19 Cases and Return to Work Criteria**, and any relevant local health department orders.

Investigation of workplace COVID-19 illnesses

We will comply with the requirements of our CPP **Investigating and Responding to COVID-19 Cases**.

COVID-19 hazard correction

In addition to the requirements of our CPP **Correction of COVID-19 Hazards**, we will take the following actions:

- In buildings or structures with mechanical ventilation, we will filter recirculated air with Minimum Efficiency Reporting Value (MERV) 13 or higher efficiency filters if compatible with the ventilation system. If MERV-13 or higher filters are not compatible with the ventilation system, we will use filters with the highest compatible filtering efficiency. We will also evaluate whether portable or mounted High Efficiency Particulate Air (HEPA) filtration units, or other air cleaning systems would reduce the risk of transmission and implement their use to the degree feasible.
- We will determine the need for a respiratory protection program or changes to an existing respiratory protection program under CCR Title 8 section 5144 to address COVID-19 hazards.
- We will evaluate whether to halt some or all operations at our workplace until COVID-19 hazards have been corrected
- Implement any other control measures deemed necessary by Cal/OSHA.

Notifications to the local health department

We will comply with the requirements of our **Multiple COVID-19 Infections and COVID-19 Outbreaks-Notifications to the Local Health Department**.

Additional Consideration #3

COVID-19 Prevention in Employer-Provided Housing

Assignment of housing units

We will ensure that shared housing unit assignments are prioritized in the following order:

- Residents who usually maintain a household together outside of work, such as family members, will be housed in the same housing unit without other persons.
- Residents who work in the same crew or work together at the same worksite will be housed in the same housing unit without other persons.
- Employees who do not usually maintain a common household, work crew, or worksite will be housed in the same housing unit only when no other housing alternatives are possible.

Physical distancing and controls

We will ensure:

- The premises are of sufficient size and layout to permit at least six feet of physical distancing between residents in housing units, common areas, and other areas of the premises.
- Beds are spaced at least six feet apart in all directions and positioned to maximize the distance between sleepers' heads. For beds positioned next to each other, i.e., side by side, the beds will be arranged so that the head of one bed is next to the foot of the next bed. For beds positioned across from each other, i.e., end to end, the beds will be arranged so that the foot of one bed is closest to the foot of the next bed. Bunk beds will not be used.
- Maximization of the quantity and supply of outdoor air and increase filtration efficiency to the highest level compatible with the existing ventilation system in housing units.

Face coverings

We will provide face coverings to all residents and provide information to residents on when they should be used in accordance with state or local health officer orders or guidance.

Cleaning and disinfection

We will ensure that:

- Housing units, kitchens, bathrooms, and common areas are effectively cleaned and disinfected at least once a day to prevent the spread of COVID-19. Cleaning and disinfecting shall be done in a manner that protects the privacy of residents.
- Unwashed dishes, drinking glasses, cups, eating utensils, and similar items are not shared.

Screening

We will encourage residents to report COVID-19 symptoms to:

COVID-19 testing

We will establish, implement, and maintain effective policies and procedures for COVID-19 testing of occupants who had a COVID-19 exposure, who have COVID-19 symptoms, or as recommended by the local health department.

Isolation of COVID-19 cases and persons with COVID-19 exposure

We will:

- Effectively isolate COVID-19 exposed residents from all other occupants. Effective isolation will include providing COVID-19 exposed residents with a private bathroom, sleeping area, and cooking and eating facility.
- Effectively isolate COVID-19 cases from all occupants who are not COVID-19 cases. Effective isolation will include housing COVID-19 cases only with other COVID-19 cases, and providing COVID-19 case occupants with a sleeping area, bathroom, and cooking and eating facility that is not shared by non-COVID-19-case occupants.
- Keep confidential any personal identifying information regarding COVID-19 cases and persons with COVID-19 symptoms, in accordance with our CPP **Investigating and Responding to COVID-19 Cases**.
- End isolation in accordance with our CPP **Exclusion of COVID-19 Cases** and **Return to Work Criteria**, and any applicable local or state health officer orders.

Additional Consideration #4

COVID-19 Prevention in Employer-Provided Transportation to and from Work

Assignment of transportation

We will prioritize shared transportation assignments in the following order:

- Employees residing in the same housing unit will be transported in the same vehicle.
- Employees working in the same crew or worksite will be transported in the same vehicle.
- Employees who do not share the same household, work crew or worksite will be transported in the same vehicle only when no other transportation alternatives are possible.

Physical distancing and face coverings

We will ensure that the:

- Physical distancing and face covering requirements of our CPP **Physical Distancing** and **Face Coverings** are followed for employees waiting for transportation.
- Vehicle operator and any passengers are separated by at least three feet in all directions during the operation of the vehicle, regardless of the vehicle's normal capacity. Vehicle operator and any passengers are provided and wear a face covering in the vehicle as required by our CPP **Face Coverings**.

Screening

We will develop, implement, and maintain effective procedures for screening and excluding drivers and riders with COVID-19 symptoms prior to boarding shared transportation.

Cleaning and disinfecting

We will ensure that:

- All high-contact surfaces (door handles, seatbelt buckles, armrests, etc.) used by passengers are cleaned and disinfected before each trip.
- All high-contact surfaces used by drivers, such as the steering wheel, armrests, seatbelt buckles, door handles and shifter, are cleaned and disinfected between different drivers.
- We provide sanitizing materials, training on how to use them properly, and ensure they are kept in adequate supply.

Ventilation

We will ensure that vehicle windows are kept open, and the ventilation system set to maximize outdoor air and not set to recirculate air. Windows do not have to be kept open if one or more of the following conditions exist:

- The vehicle has functioning air conditioning in use and the outside temperature is greater than 90 degrees Fahrenheit.
- The vehicle has functioning heating in use and the outside temperature is less than 60 degrees Fahrenheit.
- Protection is needed from weather conditions, such as rain or snow.
- The vehicle has a cabin air filter in use and the U.S. EPA Air Quality Index for any pollutant is greater than 100.

Hand hygiene

We will provide hand sanitizer in each vehicle and ensure that all drivers and riders sanitize their hands before entering and exiting the vehicle. Hand sanitizers with methyl alcohol are prohibited.
